
Our vision

We want to contribute to maintaining a stable balance between economic profitability, nature preservation and social equity in the management of natural resources.






We support sustainable development through a participatory approach in order to promote and enhance natural resources while contributing to improving the living conditions of communities and helping different social strata to solve their environmental problems.

CHILDREN IN HARMONY WITH NATURE

Many children often do not know how the foods they eat on a daily basis are produced. This observation is more visible in urban areas than in rural areas. There is no doubt that this can be observed both in Africa and in Europe where school curricula do not include the practice of agricultural concepts for children in primary and secondary schools. Our association has set itself the task of contributing to reducing this situation in a few cities in Cameroon. For this year 2022, the students of Kribi and Yaoundé have benefited from our support through practical training on the setting up of vegetable gardens in urban areas, the production of compost from household waste.



t is important to introduce children from a young age to vegetable production, so they have a clearer idea of the mechanism that allows them to have fresh vegetables on the table, for example knowing how to go from seed to vegetable ready for consumption.

LEAD POISONING AWARENESS



IChildren are the most exposed to environmental hazards including lead contamination or lead poisoning. Lead is a health hazard, it is unfortunately found in several substances that are close to us. For example, paints, toys, etc. Through awareness-raising activities, around a hundred students learned about the dangers and understood the negative impacts that this can cause on their health.

ORPHANS AND ABANDONED CHILDREN AT THE SCHOOL OF RESILIENCE AND URBAN AGRICULTURE



The purpose of education for a man or a woman is to train him, and it is thanks to practical training that one becomes autonomous. A Chinese proverb says "When a man is hungry, it is better to teach him to fish than to give him fish". This is why our action this year targeted the orphans and abandoned children of the Children Hope orphanage in Kribi. More than thirty children have been trained on the notions of resilience and the importance and implementation of gardens and vegetable patches in urban areas. They all participated together with our team in the preparation of their garden, sowing, transplanting and maintenance of the garden. Several speculations have been sown, namely okra, lettuce, leek, basil, celery, etc. The harvests have been fruitful and the children are proud of learning and also of consuming what they have sown themselves.








CONTRIBUTION TO HOUSEHOLD WASTE MANAGEMENT

Les municipalités rencontrent de nombreux problèmes dans la gestion des déchets ménagers. Les dépôts d'ordures sont présents le long des rues et à plusieurs carrefours dans les villes. CONTRIBUTION TO HOUSEHOLD WASTE MANAGEMENT

In order to involve the population in the management and recovery of waste, we have trained more than 700 women and children on the techniques of selective sorting at home and the composting of biodegradable waste and also the reuse of plastic bags and containers in order to extend their lifespan before deteriorating. Thus, 10 composters of 1 cubic meter each have been installed in the households

Nearly 80% of the waste produced daily by households is biodegradable waste that can be recycled in urban agriculture. In the city of Kribi, we have through cleanliness campaigns succeeded in collecting more than 1003.5 kg of biodegradable waste and 1500 plastic bags (about 375 kg) during this year. The biodegradable waste collected has enabled us to obtain more than 300 kg of compost and the plastic bags have been reused as vegetable bags.




PARTICIPATION IN THE INTERNATIONAL VOLUNTEERING AND SOLIDARITY FAIR

The second edition of the International Volunteering and Solidarity Fair (SIVS) was held from October 6 to 8, 2022 at the Yaoundé multipurpose sports hall. ASD contributed to the success of this event alongside France Volontaire, the main initiator of the show. Through guided tours and exhibitions, we received more than a hundred visitors to our stand on this occasion.

At the same time, we took advantage of the diversity of visitors to conduct a small survey. We wanted to know what are the qualities of women that can improve forest management, it appears that it is the dynamism (56.7%) and the spirit of leadership (46.7%) that are key in this regard. We also wanted to know what are the constraints related to the involvement of women in forest management, it appears that the majority constraint is based on family obligations (56.7%) then the lack of self-confidence (40%).

PARTICIPATION IN THE WORLD CIRCULAR ECONOMY FORUM



In Cameroon, the concept of circular economy is new and its implementation is not entirely easy given the fact that manufacturers who design and market new products; and the populations who consume these products are not sufficiently sensitized and trained on this subject.

It is to provide the beginning of a solution that the world forum for the circular economy was organized, a Yaoundé studio in which ASD participated in December 2022. This forum enabled the sharing of experience of several start-ups, SMEs, manufacturers who already have some circular economy initiatives.

ASD had the privilege of participating in the panel on the challenges and perspectives of financing circular economy projects in Cameroon.

It was an opportunity to talk about the funding received from our partners of the GEF SGP UNDP and the International Organization of La Francophonie (OIF) and to launch a crush on new partners to support our actions in the field.

Our experience in supporting households and young people in the practice of selective sorting of waste at source and their recovery in compost and the reuse of plastic bags in urban agriculture has been appreciated by all.

PARTICIPATION IN THE WORLD CIRCULAR ECONOMY FORUM

We went to touch on an enriching experience on the recovery of faecal sludge into compost carried out by the urban community of Yaoundé through the Network of Faecal Sludge Collection Operators of Yaoundé (ROCOBY).



ECOSYSTEM RESTORATION: "THE GREEN VISION FOR MANGROVES FOREST"

This project aimed to enhance continuous resilience of coastal the vulnerable population in the Kribi coastal Zone by promoting alternative source of livelihood to the people that will prevent them from destroying mangroves thereby mitigating climate change impact on the mangrove ecosystem that is triggered by activities anthropogenic such as overexploitation, conversion pressure and pollution effect have degraded mangroves and biodiversity in general in this region by 20-30% over the last decades.

Project outcomes include 25 women fish smokers and fishermen were trained on alternative source of income in aquaculture, poultry and piggery. After this technical training piggery was adopted by target group; four piglets and five bags of pigfeed (in cash and kind) was donated to the target group.

More so, the 20 women Fish smokers were trained on the use and management of improved smoked oven to reduce firewood fetch, promote gender health, and improve of their livelihood.

SUPPORT FOR AVAEV'S HEALTH CAMPAIGN



Sustainable development can only take place with healthy people!

This is why in 2022 ASD joined the team of the Association of Volunteers for the Assistance of Child Victims of HIV (AVAEV) to organize a free health campaign.

This action was also made possible thanks to the donation of medical equipment and consumables from the "Auvergne Humanitarian Pharmacists" to AVAEV. More than a hundred children, women and men from the municipality of Yaoundé 1 have benefited from free care. Some patients received donations to encourage them to take better care of their health.
